Photo Information Simplicity

The most powerful images are often the most simple ones. Simplicity underscores beauty in nature in a way that busy compositions don't. Nature photographer Jim Zuckerman says, "When I'm in the field and I study land forms, macro details, or wildlife with a critical eye, my first thought is to find subjects that I can isolate from the whole. I always look for the simplest design elements possible."

Examples of simplicity in nature abound. Even when a complex set of elements is before you, the right lens and a sense of artistry can turn a compositional mess into a simple elegant statement. For example, a forest is anything but simple. With a macro lens, though, you can isolate the curvature of a leaf, water drops on lichen, a bark pattern, or an intimate group of mushrooms. Similarly, a herd of caribou can present a complex set of components, but with a long lens you can isolate only the graphic form of one of the animals on a ridge.

Simplicity involves two important aspects. First, the subject must consist of no more than a few graphic shapes. Second, the background must not be intrusive. Out-of-focus backgrounds and solid backgrounds work best.

Photographic simplicity usually involves only one subject and therefore, one point of focus. When all of a viewer's attention is centered on one thing, the impact of the subject is much greater than if other elements in the composition simultaneously compete for attention.

lower 48 states. Along Movie Road several serial westerns such as The Lone Ranger and Roy Rogers were filmed, also Star Trek, and various movies such as Gandhi, Worms, etc. While photographing we met a retired forest ranger that was quite informative about the area. Talking with a native of the region always makes your visit more interesting.

My favorite stop was at Bodie, the best-preserved ghost town in the U.S. and it is now a California State Park. Its elevation is approximately 8500 feet. At one time there were 10,000 people living and working in Bodie with 50 saloons and 10 brothels. There have been a couple of fires, but there are a large number of buildings still standing. At Bodie we had a magical blue sky, with big puffy white clouds, and golden light at the end of the day. If you love visiting ghost towns and you haven't been to Bodie you definitely need to put it on your To Visit list.

We photographed Mono Lake and the Tufa formations, Lundy Canyon which had great fall color of yellow and orange aspens mixed with the light green of the sage and dark green of the pines. We hit all the great spots for Yosemite pictures of Half Dome and El Capitan. And last on our tour was the Ancient Bristlecone Pines up at elevations of 9,000-11,000 feet. We had to get acclimated to the elevation before we went that high.

I love photographing mountains and all the great scenery. I, however, do not like traveling on those narrow mountain roads! I like best to be in the valley shooting up at the mountains. I just don't care for those 69% grades where the road is windy and curvy, seems like it is pretty much straight downhill (change that to down MOUNTAIN), I am on the outside edge and all I can see is blue sky. My saying by the end of the week was next time I may have to take a flatlander vacation.

All in all it was a great vacation! Even though the mountain roads at times were terrifying. I hope everyone has had the opportunity to get out in nature this fall and enjoy it. I hope that I have not bored you with my summer (fall) vacation story. Thank you for reading.
