N4C President's Message

Connie and I were in South Carolina the last week in March and the first week in April. South Carolina was the only state of the United States that we had not visited before our trip. We picked a beautiful time to be in South Carolina, more on that later. The coastal area of South Carolina reminded us of Florida with palm trees, live oak trees and Spanish Moss. We did not see all parts of South Carolina, just areas that might be the most scenic or historical. The only drawback of being there the first week in April was that it was Spring Break time so more people were about.

At Columbia, the capital city, we went to the zoo and botanical garden. We saw school children gathered on the State House (Capitol Building) steps where they were lobbying for more money for school libraries. Charleston there are several former plantations that have beautiful gardens. We went to Magnolia Plantation where we saw several interesting white bridges over shallow bodies of water (where you could get a picture of the bridge and its reflection) with deep pink azaleas in the background. The flowering bushes or shrubs; dark pink, light pink, white and orange azaleas, Japanese Purple Wisteria and the dogwood trees were very beautiful. Near Myrtle Beach we went to Brookgreen Gardens where more than 550 sculptures are set in 10 separate gardens. The gardens also had azaleas; wisteria and dogwood as well as an alligator. The two gardens had another unique feature, once you paid to get into the garden you could go back to the garden for the next five days free of charge. We took advantage of this feature at Brookgreen Gardens. On the first day I took pictures on my digital and 35mm film cameras and on the second day I took stereo and medium format (2 1/4 slide) pictures.

Historically, we saw two coastal forts near Charleston that played a role at the time of the Civil War. The World War II aircraft carrier USS Yorktown is docked near Charleston. We visited two other plantations near Charleston where we saw old plantation buildings. It was a wonderful trip to a beautiful state where we met a lot of wonderful people.

from Central Iowa CC SHARP FOCUS:-

Aperture Priority

Aperture priority allows one to set the shutter speed to control motion and depth of field. By setting the camera to aperture priority mode you are actually setting the f-stop on the camera and the camera will set the shutter speed in relationship to the amount of lighting the film plane or the digital sensor built in the camera.

If you set the f-stop to f8, the camera, according to the light, may set the shutter speed to 1/500th of a second. This allows you to control depth of field. Depth of field simply means the area that is in focus. Let the lighting change and that same f-stop of f8 may change to 1/60th of a second shutter speed.

If you have a large lens mounted on the camera, you could get camera shake or blurred picture. 200mm lens should always be shot at least 1/250 shutter speed—this will help minimize camera shake. To do this, change the f-stop to 4.0 and you will have a higher shutter speed and less camera shake.

When would you want to use aperture? To stop action, maximize depth of field and smear the background and throw background out of focus.

KISS Guide to Photography:-Framing

*There's more to good photography than just focusing on the most beautiful things around you. To take a good photograph, you need to "edit out" the bad parts of our surroundings too.

*Your subject will only fill the frame on your prints if they first fill the frame in your viewfinder. Get closer to your subject and fill the frame!

*You can control perspective through use of your zoom lens. That means that you can change the visual relationship between your

subject and the background.

*Your zoom lens is not an alternative to walking closer to your subject. The more you experiment with the different effects you can achieve, the more you will understand when and when not to use your zoom.

*There is more than one way to hold a camera and you should make a choice for each and every picture you take.

*There is more than one viewpoint from which you can take any picture. Move around, up, and down in search for the best shot.


Raffle Heirloom Bracket Clock
