N4C Presidents Message-Nov. 2008

Happy Holidays to all across N4C land. Here's hoping that you all had a great and fun Thanksgiving, and celebrated it with family and friends: we all have a lot to be thankful for. We can also be thankful for the opportunity to take photos in this great, beautiful land we live in.

Now we look forward to Christmas and a new challenge: how to take pictures of lights and get the great picture you are looking for. Sometimes, in my case, they can just look like a glob of lights and I have trouble getting the right exposure. Also, take pictures of a house full of lights and you don't see the house. Suggestion: take the photos at dusk and the lights will be on and you can see each of them and also see the outline of the house and it tells the story. The early morning or evening is the best time to take them. Use the aperture priority mode and a high setting (for smaller aperture opening), so all the lights are in focus from front to back. Also, use this for the family dinner table and everyone at the table will be in focus, too. And you can adjust for a smaller setting (for larger aperture opening) to blur out the lights in the background around the item of interest you are shooting. Have fun shooting this Christmas and remember to take along your gloves, as it does get cold out there at this time of the year.

At convention this last fall, it was discussed to have everyone use the digital judging program for all judging. Comments were made concerning the pros and cons of using this program for all judging. How complicated would it be to learn this program and make it work? I had not seen it in action and wasn't sure how it would work. So, this month our club judged the B&W and Color prints for the Sioux City and they were using the program, so I went to observe. We also judged the N4C digital slides, this month, and it was used there also. After seeing this in action, I would recommend everyone think about trying the new program. At least have a training session on it and get to know how it works and the benefits of using it. The main thing is that the results can be e-mailed to the proper people that keep the records, quickly and accurately. The judging sheets, "with comments", could then be e-mailed to the respective clubs or printed out and included in the prints when sent back. After you've seen it or tried it let us know your thoughts and comments.

up for you to create your very own versions of these spell-binding creations that look literally impossible. Gerry can't guarantee that no light bulbs will be harmed during this photography, but you can be sure that you will see something

new and also learn how you might recreate the same effects for yourself or your club's use.

But that's not all; there will be numerous other chances to photograph other setup's including some of the techniques that Barbara Russell uses for flower still life using available light photography.



And when you tire of taking photographs, you can participate in a workshop using either Adobe Bridge or Lightroom software as a part of your workflow. Even if you



don't use either of these software solutions you will be able to get a 'practical' demonstration of how this software might be useful. Or you can come prepared with your own software to demonstrate.

And of course, the outdoor opportunities abound at Springbrook. Wildlife and wildflowers are a part of the landscape just waiting to get your camera and creative juices flowing.

Photography Exhibit: Figge Art Museum 225 W. Second St. Davenport, IA

In the Light: Photographs from the Sikkema Collection (Runs through January 4, 2009)

Featured Experimental Photographers

Harold Edgerton, the inventor of stroboscope photography, used this technology to capture an image at the split second a bullet pierces an apple and deck of cards. Some of Edergton's photos show sports-related subject matter, while others are simpler like the image of a single droplet of milk creating a coronet pattern. Barbara Morgan captured the kinetic energy of modern dance in her photographs through experimenting with double exposure and photomontages. Eliot Porter, an early experimenter in dye transfer color photography, was renowned for taking photographs that were ecologically and culturally significant. Olivia Parker focused on the simple and abstract beauty of still-lifes through special dark room techniques. Photographs by Carlotta Corpron and György Kepes demonstrate their techniques in abstraction, light, and exposure.

An interactive photo area for families called "Studio 1" will supplement the exhibition and allow visitors to experiment with light, texture, angle of view, and have an opportunity to recreate their own version of some of the photos from the *In the Light* exhibition. Digital cameras are encouraged in the interactive center, but are not permitted in the galleries.

About Brent Sikkema

Growing up on a farm in Morrison, Illinois, Brent Sikkema's journey began by taking a bus to the Art Institute in Chicago. In the 1970s and 1980s he worked with almost every major living photographer. Today Mr. Sikkema is the principal at Sikkema-Jenkins Gallery in NYC, which represents painters, videographers, sculptors, installation artists and the like.

Goo Goo Inspiration By Walt Fluegel - North Metro Photo Club

What drives a person, or what is the motivation, for someone to take up the camera and snap pictures? Could it be the desire and thrill of handling a camera, the creative aspects, looking for something new, the historian or record keeper in us, the social aspects of being with other photographers, the profit motive if we sell a photo, or other things? Or is it all of the above?

A new baby arrives in a home and mom just has to have a photo or two, or three, or a dozen of the tyke. Out comes a point and shoot camera. Snap, snap, and more snaps as baby grows, friends admire mom's aesthetic touch, and they want mom to snap photos of their children, and on and on, until mom begins to accept payment for her efforts to please her friends. Start a business? A business starts.

Dad watches baby on weekends while mom snaps other infants. Now what? Birthday parties, play get-togethers, and other gatherings need photos as word spreads and mom passes around business cards and has a web site. Now what? One digital camera is the work horse for this small business, but mom sees green and wants independence from her day job. She eyes better equipment. She knows she is a good photographer.

Professionals charge \$50 or more for an 8 X 10 inch glossy photo. Mom is charging \$10 to her friends and their friends, so is that enough for mom to have a successful business? This is the hard part for mom to decide because mom wants more than just snaps from her point and shoot and requires a digital SLR. Mom also needs better lighting than a flash, different props and locations, different lenses for her SLR, and the expenses pile up especially if she is on the internet. Mom no longer has a day job, and this new business can get mighty draining on dad's wallet unless mom begins to up the price per photo. Will she lose her friends and their cash? Will she also do weddings? But is mom a business person at heart? Does mom really understand the business aspects of being a professional photographer? What started out as being in love with a sleeping, or gurgling, or wide eyed cherub in a crib and having a camera handy became a small business. It is now up to many other factors for mom and dad on an adventure they may not have planned for. What was the motivation, a cute baby picture, the releasing of hidden artistic talent, profit motive, ... what?

Results sent via computer printout - whether emailed or printed and mailed - can be entered into the newsletter in a much more accurate, timely, and consistent manner. If you haven't yet tried using the application available on the N4C website, you might want to consider it.

For those who are still filling out judging forms by hand - and that is perfectly OK- I'd like to ask that you <u>PRINT</u> clearly the names of the entrant and the title of the work. This month there were about ten names or titles that either required some research to interpret or required a phone call to the entrant to straighten out. Please use pen, and check all copies of your carbonless forms to make sure they are copying properly. And again, PRINTING your results, judges names, etc. is the best way to make sure they are legible. You may think you have lovely penmanship, but your "A"s can look like "O"s or "U"s. Don't even get me started on "M"s, "N"s, "V"s and "W"s.



Do it yourself (if you can)- Tripod Overhaul



After I got serious about my photography (well sort of serious anyway) my use of a tripod increased from zero to 100% as I had never liked them, thought them heavy and that they got in the way. Imagine my surprise four short years later where my tripod and I have an "I - Thou" relationship and use it at least 95% of the time. Having traded my heavier aluminum tripod for a spiffy Gitzo carbon fiber I found myself about a month ago in need of some maintenance for it as it was becoming stiff and I was considering taking a channel lock or vice grip along with me to undo one of the legs.

My childhood was spent on a 200 acre Iowa farm complete with a Dad who was always carefully taking things apart, finding the broken piece and taking it to the implement dealer for replacement so it was only natural that I attempt to solve this little problem myself. My first stop was to "google" gitzo tripod maintenance on the internet and see what I could find and wa-lah, there it was a really nice article plus a photo of two guys in their hip waders with several thousand dollars worth of equipment supported with their Gitzo tripods - just what I needed. (<u>www.NatureScapes.Net</u>) If these guys could keep their tripods working with that much brackish water and such I was game to try as well. Mine has certainly been wet, in lots of sand and in salt water so these guys became my role models.


The site had very specific illustrated photos and great explanations as well as an opportunity to order from them the necessary bushings for replacements. The bushings came 3 days later, I picked up mineral spirits and lithium grease from the hardware store and I was set.

Following the directions which were VERY CLEAR, I took all sections of the legs off, cleaned them with mineral spirits, used a little steel wool on one of the legs, and let all of them dry. It was almost no effort to put the 27 new bushings on the legs and reassemble and apply a little white lithium grease to the threads. (Lithium grease is interesting stuff, very light weight an is not affected by temperature extremes) The result is my tripod works as well as it did when it came out of the box and I'm just as pleased as I can be.

Disassembly isn't for everyone but in this case the directions were crystal clear, the parts were Gitzo parts, it didn't take very long and then there is that satisfaction of having done it myself.
