Saving YouTube Videos for Reference

Tutorials on YouTube are becoming more popular and some are handy to save to your own computer for future referral. There are several free programs that make this possible.

With "Youtube Downloader HD" you can download high quality and high definition videos from YouTube. <u>http://www.youtubedownloaderhd.com/</u>

If the video is available in HD I have found that saving (downloading) it in ".AVI HD" format gives the best quality – actually better than watching it from YouTube or MP4.

If you do not have a viewer on your computer that plays .AVI files, I find the free VLC Media Player plays AVI and other formats very nicely. <u>http://www.videolan.org/vlc/</u>

Christmas Done, Now What?

Christmas is over and the return to the day job is imminent. Here in the "Upper (aka Frigid) Midwest" we talk about the photographic opportunities of four seasons. Oscar



on the left is wondering what we're going to do next since the toys of summer are underneath feet of ice and snow. Well as you know, it's always a great time for photography. I've been doing some experimentation during this break with just how many layers are needed to make use of the large bird feeding station in West Des Moines when zero and wind chill are overused in the weather forecast. For me the number is three for feet and legs with toe warmers in my insulated bean boots

and more like four for the upper body. I didn't realize that fleece came in so many




different sizes and shapes. Gloves that are warm AND allow operation of the shutter release for an extended period of time are more than a casual challenge. The best I've found is a combination of two layers-an 'Under Armor' liner or thermalux with handy pouch used with a hand warmer in the palm that spreads some of the warmth to the fingers and an outside shell with down or synthetic 'microloft'. This upside down feathered friend was taken last week during an extended session in West Des Moines, using the liner + microloft glove combination and a hand warmer in the palm. Another trick, switching hands with a remote cable release in jacket pocket and managing the tripod kept BOTH hands warm enough. A vertical grip with two batteries for DSLR or a pro level DSLR will do just fine at the 0 degrees F or lower.



The other option that works just as well in the dead of winter is to find

something inside for your attention. I have an addiction for milkweed pods and the winter light coming inside the sun room is ideal for capturing the ideal combination for that next N4C contest. And then there is

photographic coverage of the recent pigeon show at the Iowa State Fairgrounds. What, you missed it? This wonderful specimen begged for at

course the pigeon on the left with a different slant. Thanks to Diane Darnielle for sharing her techniques with the "Distort" filter in Photoshop. Note the eye and beak positions in center and right and the stripes on the left and bottom (the cage bars). Yes it is the time of year for photography. In N4C we enjoy all the seasons.

Study Groups on the Web



The N₄C Photo Essay Contest

Telling Your Story Deadline: March 31, 2010

A picture is worth a thousand words—but what if <u>your</u> picture(s) are asking for some music and words to complete the story! The N4C photo essay is your chance to combine your photography, your choice of music, and if you wish narration to tell your friends about your favorite place for photography, illustrate a 'how to', or just to have fun. The subject matter is completely open, you can mix and match the old and new, and use as much creativity and imagination as you can find (or borrow from those who have done this before!). **Note that the maximum length is 6 minutes.**

Telling **your** story will require images, lots of images, so its a good time to see if you have what you need to complete the story. The sound component can be music that complements the visual portion or narration or a combination of the two as you see fit. The last example you've seen from N4C was the 'promo' for the 2010 convention in Lacrosse! Now you've got the picture as we say.

Here's the best guidance for producing an essay: use any software you want to put your essay together, but make sure that it can be exported to a standard DVD [not Blueray] format. Software and playback are more challenging now that the reliable standard, Windows XP, has two operating system upgrades on the PC side (Vista and Windows 7.) Pro Show Gold or Producer (Photodex) are favorites of PC users, while those with Mac's favor iMovie o6, iMovie o8 or iMovie o9 (three different programs) or Final Cut Pro Express. DVD playback on PC's has been problematic, especially with different versions of Vista. Test yours on the home TV, any Mac, or a Windows XP operating system on a PC. The end result should play on all computers and on your home DVD player. If you have any questions about software, conversion to DVD format or other topics, please don't hesitate to contact me directly at *d.tomes@mac.com* or call me at 515 986 3913. [Note that we agreed to experiment with web based playback at the N4C convention on an experimental basis. If interested please contact me!]

Here's what you need to know about the judging. The three areas that are judged are (1) overall impression, (2) photography and (3) commentary and sound track. The overall impression includes interest, originality, mood and impact while the photography stresses the familiar categories of technical quality, composition, variety, and absence of distractions. The commentary and sound track are judged on their style, appropriateness, and combination of music, narration, and sound effects. One additional factor for the slide essay is how all the components flow together to <u>tell the story</u>—visually, sound, and 'smoothness'.
