tical image. Vertical images usually are more visually exciting and create more tension. Here are two images taken at Mirror Lake in Wyoming that demonstrate this.

Well I have been all over the place with this message. To sum it up: (1) I am so glad it is spring; (2) I'm ready to get out and photograph more; (3) It's important to see and hear what others have to say about photography, as it can teach us something new, remind us to do things we already know how to do, and get us excited again if we need it; (4) Share what we have learned; (5) Do it with good friends.

#### Macro Photography with Multiple Flash Units

Dwight Tomes The Sore Loser

I enjoy macro (1:1 or greater) photography because interesting details that most photographers never see are revealed—*a little like magic for me*. But I'm a grouch when it comes to setting up a shot. Very sharp detail and maximum depth of field are a must. Natural light is missing or insufficient even on sunny days and for entertainment during the dark time of the year one gets more light from other sources--external flashes. And I don't like wires between the camera and flashes because they make composition much more tedious and complicated. Bottom line: multiple flash units that reliably conform to my manual shutter and f-stop settings TTL (through the lens), simple set up that doesn't interfere with subject matter. The following examples use Canon body, lens and flash units specified for each photograph. The basic setup consists of camera and lens, transmitter (either in camera or transmitter on hot shoe), and two or more standard ttl



flash units (infrared signal). <u>The same techniques illustrated for macro photography</u> <u>can also be used for portrait photography</u>. The Canon 7D, 60D, and 70D bodies have internal flash control built in while the 5D MarkIII requires the ST-E2 **7D body**, **MPE 65, 320EX(2) flash** transmitter. A canon MPE 65 lens (1:1 to 5X macro photography), 90mm TS, and 100mm Macro lenses were used with extension tubes and/or a 1.4 tele-convertor. The following images are about 3x life size. Do you see the details on the coin such as the plant and V marking on flame? Note texture on milk weed seed.

Excellent detail of the milkweed pod, numbers and circuit detail of memory stick.



Note blue background on image to right.





Memory stick detail w/100 mm macro + 12mm extension + 1.4 extender

The 100 mm macro lens shows superior performance with better reso-

lution, contrast and detail. Note the name of the memory stick maker (Hynix) is visible on this but not on the 90MM TS lens image above.

At a recent DMCC still life shoot a change for me was the addition of a background for the image. I've generally placed the subject so that there is

ample space behind the subject to hide the background—i.e. a non-distracting black background. You will note a blue background (if you look carefully) on the image on the right and bottom right. This background is close enough that the light from the flash lights up the background also.

The camera settings for these photos were based on using manual settings: 1/200 (so that subject motion is controlled from ambient light), F16-32 with transmitter and 2

Canon 320X Mark 5D MKIII, 100mm macro, 12mm ext, 1.4X units used as 'slaves'. Tele converter, live view manual focusing. What fun!!!
